Preparing for a flood:

Some advice and guidance for an emergency






Don't wait until it's too late!

Living in an area that can be prone to occasional flooding – whether from river or coastal sources – means being prepared is key.

Preparation in advance means you can:



What can I do in advance?

Dependent on your circumstances, we would recommend the following preparation as a bare minimum to prepare for flooding:

- Sign up for free flood warnings with Floodline by calling 0345 988 1188. Provide Floodline with your address and you can receive free warnings by phone, email and/or text message.
- If you own a property including or next to a river, stream or ditch, recognise your legal responsibility as a riparian landowner (unless your Title Deeds state otherwise). Ensure the watercourse is clear and free-flowing where the watercourse is between two (or more properties), each owner is equally responsible. For more advice, contact the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506.
- Recognise in advance all the entry points for water into your home.

 Doorways are obvious, but have you considered air-bricks, cable entry points and service points for utilities?
- Prepare the relevant flood protection for your entry points silicon sealant for small entry points may be sufficient, but investment may be required for others. Have you considered flood boards or other flood defences? The Blue Pages directory www.bluepages.org.uk highlights flood products available in the UK.
- Consider whether sandbags are right for you; although they can provide limited protection for a short period of time (especially when used with plastic sheeting), they are time consuming to fill and lay, not fully water-proof and classed as contaminated waste once used in flood defences.
- Does your home have a second storey? If so, can you safely evacuate to this area in the event of a flood? If not, where can you go?
- Can you readily disconnect your electricity and gas supplies if required? Can you eat and drink safely without these supplies?
- **Prepare a Home Emergency Plan.** In the event of a flood, this handy checklist will help you to remember the right things at the right time. We have provided a simple Home Emergency Plan for you to complete on the back of this publication.
- **Have spare clothes**, wellingtons, waterproofs, torch (with spare batteries), radio, medicine, food and drink readily available in an easily accessible Emergency Pack.

Who can I turn to in a flood?

In the first instance, you should be relying on what **you** have done in advance of any flood risk. Legally, it is the responsibility of property owners to take appropriate action to protect their property from flooding.

In a flooding emergency, the Council's core priority is to protect the public at large. With the resources at its disposal, the Council will not be able to assist a large number of individual homeowners who may find their properties threatened by flooding, and it does not have a duty to provide sandbags.

Dependent on the circumstances, we recommend the following:

- If you need to be evacuated because of severe flooding or damage, contact the **Police** or dial **999**.
- If you believe the flooding is from a main river, contact the **Environment Agency** on **0345 988 1188.**
- To report general flood or drainage issues, contact **Hampshire County Council** on **0300 555 1375.**
- Notify **Southern Water** if flooding affects your mains sewage by calling **0330 303 0368**.
- Notify the **National Grid** to report a gas leak as the result of flooding on **nann 111 999**
- Notify SSE of electrical issues such as power cuts by calling 105.
- For non-emergency calls pertaining to vulnerable older people, call **Hampshire** County Council Adult Services on 0300 555 1386 (office hours) or 0300 555 1373 (out of hours).
